[The angel] said to them, "Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here." (Mark 16:6, ESV)

The Apostle Paul writes, "Just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too [will] walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:4, ESV)

Baseball season is starting soon. Spring training games are going on right now, and the regular season starts on March 28th (which happens to be Maundy Thursday this year). So the other day, I was checking out the baseball news on the ESPN website, and a headline caught my attention. It said that a former Major League Baseball player had just passed away. He was a pitcher named Jose DeLeon.

I knew the name, because he had played five of his thirteen seasons with the Chicago White Sox. He had a mediocre career, not particularly good, but not particularly bad either. But the thing that caught my eye in the headline was at the very end. It said that DeLeon had passed away "at the age of 63." That struck me because, in September of this year, I will celebrate my 63rd birthday. I feel like I still have a lot of years left in this world. But when I see my own age in the death notice of another person, it always makes me pause and think about how brief our life in this world really is.

That's why the Easter story becomes more important for me every year. I am a person who rarely reads a book a second time. Once I know how the story ends, I'm done with it. I'm ready to move on to something else. But the Easter story is one that I love to hear over and over again. I know the ending so well. I know that the tomb is empty. I know that Jesus is alive. But I want to hear it again. I want to hear the angel say, "You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has risen; he is not here."

I love to hear that familiar story because it is just as relevant to us, in our day, as it was to those who first heard it, almost two thousand years ago. It is relevant because every one of us will someday be like Jose DeLeon. Every one of us will die in this world. And the question is, "What happens next?" The Easter story gives us the answer. Paul says, "Just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too [will] walk in newness of life."

That is what the Easter story means for me. That is what it means for all of us. If we believe in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior, we don't need to be afraid to die in this world. We can live in the promise that our time on earth is just the beginning of our story. There is so much more to come. We have a joyful eternal life waiting for us in heaven. And when we get there, we will be welcomed with open arms by Jesus, the one who made it all possible. That is a story that never gets old!

Lenten Disciplines

Each year, during the season of Lent, I like to offer three disciplines for the congregation. Lenten disciplines have a long history in the Christian Church. They are meant to help us focus on the great sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, by taking on some small sacrifices in our own lives for the duration of Lent. These disciplines are entirely voluntary. They are between you and God. Here are the three challenges for 2024:

- 1. Try to be in worship as often as possible during Lent, on both the Wednesday nights and the Sunday mornings. And invite a family member or friend (someone who does not usually attend) to come with you at least once during the season.
- 2. Give up something that you enjoy during the season of Lent, as a way of remembering that Jesus gave up his life for us. Or you can turn it around and add something good to your life during Lent that you are not currently doing—something like daily prayer, daily Bible reading, or daily exercise. (Lent begins at midnight on Ash Wednesday, February 14th and ends at midnight on the Saturday before Easter, March 30th)
- 3. Do a random act of kindness for another person. It can be an offer to help a person with a task that needs to be done. Or it can be an anonymous act, like giving a financial gift to someone that you know who is in need.
