

*“Come now, let us reason together, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow.” (Isaiah 1:18, ESV)*

As I sit in my office on this last day of January, 2019, I’m thinking about cold weather. Early this morning, just before dawn, the northern half of Illinois experienced some of the coldest temperatures ever recorded in the state. I still haven’t seen the official low temperature for Princeton, but it had to be close to -30 degrees Fahrenheit. I say this because the Quad Cities airport reported a low of -33 and the Peru airport had a low of -28.

But those weren’t even close to the lowest temperatures recorded this morning! Some towns in the northwest part of the state are reporting temperatures near -40 which, if verified, would break the record for the coldest temperature ever recorded in the history of the state of Illinois (the current verified record is a reading of -36 in the town of Congerville on January 5, 1999). So it was probably the coldest night that any of us will ever experience in this area for our entire lives.

But now, as I look out my office window in the middle of the afternoon, I can see snow falling. We’ve had a good amount of snow already this season. But this new snow is a sign that the extreme cold is over and the temperatures are rising again. I know that it will have to be shoveled and plowed and stomped off of our shoes before we step in the house, but right now it is a beautiful sight. Everything outside is being covered by a glistening blanket of pure, white, untouched snow.

I wonder if the prophet Isaiah was looking at the same kind of scene when he wrote the words at the top of this page. In the verses just before these words, Isaiah was speaking a harsh prophecy from the Lord, condemning the people of Judah for their sin and immorality. He called them “a people laden with iniquity, offspring of evildoers, children who deal corruptly.” He accused them of “forsaking the Lord,” and “despising the Holy One of Israel.”

Then, in Isaiah 1:18, the Lord says, “Come now, let us reason together.” It was an ominous statement. It sounded like God was about to bring down the hammer. It sounded like he was about to pronounce some terrible judgment on his people. But the next words were something completely unexpected. The same Lord who had just condemned the people for their sin and rebellion suddenly said to them, “Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow.” It was an invitation. He was saying, “Right now, you have the blood of your sins on your hands. But I will cleanse you. I will make you as white as snow.”

But how could this happen? How could the sins of the people simply be washed away? We find the answer in the New Testament, in 1 John 1:7. How will God turn our bloody sins into pure white snow? John writes, “The blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.” All we need to do is humble ourselves before the one who died on the cross for us.

These last few days have been cold and harsh, like the harsh words of judgment from our holy and righteous God. But the snow that is falling now is like a beautiful reminder of the mercy of our tender and forgiving God. It reminds us that if we will surrender our lives to Jesus Christ, his blood will wash away all of our scarlet sins. It will drive away all of God’s judgment. And our Lord and Savior will cover us with the pure white blanket of his perfect love and his amazing grace.

The meeting began in prayer. The agenda & minutes from the December meeting were approved.

Pastor's Report – Along with his usual schedule of meetings & worship services, other activities were as follows: Advent Suppers & Worship services, Staff party, Children's program, Caroling with Chili Supper, & 2 funerals. A New Member class will begin in January. Pastor would like another Lenten Challenge—to read the Bible in 1 year. Special Bibles will be purchased where all recommended readings are together on one day, making it easier for people to follow. We will have these ready to pick up before Ash Wednesday.

Administrator's report – 105 average Sunday attendance in December. Wednesday Advent services averaged 47 and a total of 187 worshiped on Christmas Eve.

The Financial Reports were approved subject to audit.

Property – safety inspections, larger mailbox, office chair replacements, light switches in parsonage replaced, replaced classroom lights with LEDs, more emergency lights in sanctuary, redecorate kitchen & replace smoke & fire detectors.

Service & Mission – Freedom House collections March 17 & September 15 with \$250 from benevolence, 2019 benevolences have been approved, additional funds for 2018 were \$1022, \$700 for Mobile food pantry & \$322 to PADS Family Addition, Prayer Breakfast at 8:30am Feb. 16

Outreach & Fellowship – Family movie night Sat., Feb. 2<sup>nd</sup> at 6:00 with meal of Sloppy Joes & hot dogs, bring whatever to go with those items, popcorn will be provided, attendance at Bible Journaling class was 19.

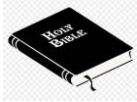
Youth & Education – Increased budget for Sunday School/VBS to serve a growing program, Pastor taking youth to LCMC Event.

Where have the years gone? As I have had time to reflect (I am now retired and have more time to reflect) I have truly been blessed in my ministry. After serving as Associate Pastor at Salem Lutheran in Moline for a few years, members of First Lutheran trusted God and called me as their pastor, even though I was a Cardinal's fan.
