

“No one puts new wine into old wineskins. If he does, the wine will burst the skins—and the wine is destroyed, and so are the skins. But new wine is for fresh wineskins.” (Mark 2:22)

I enjoy an occasional glass of a good, dry red wine. I like the way that it smells. I like the way that I can detect different flavors when I swish it around in my mouth. And I like the way that the tannins make my cheeks pucker. I tend to like the California wines best—a good Cabernet from Napa or an Old Vine Zinfandel from Lodi. But I’m no wine snob. I’m willing to try anything. I’ve found many inexpensive wines that are as good as or better than any of the expensive wines that I’ve tasted. And I’ve often been pleasantly surprised by a new wine that someone suggested to me.

In the Bible verse above, Jesus is talking about new wine. His comments were a response to people who were criticizing him. They were criticizing him because he didn’t speak or act like the Pharisees and the other teachers of his day. In fact, he was often challenging their interpretations of Scripture and their manmade rules and traditions. They were trying to defend the old order of things. But Jesus was doing something new. And the best analogy that he could think of for his new way of teaching was the analogy of new wine.

In first century Israel, they didn’t have glass bottles and corks to store their wine. When the new crop of grapes was harvested, they would squeeze out the juice and pour it into watertight animal skin pouches. And those skins had to be new. Because when the grape juice began to ferment into wine, the gases from the fermentation process would expand the skin and stretch it out.

An old wineskin was one that had already been stretched to its limit. Once it was empty, it could be used to store other liquids, like water or milk, but it could never be used to store wine again. If you tried to put new wine into an old, stretched-out wineskin, the fermentation process would burst the skin, and both the wine and the skin would be ruined. So Jesus was saying, “Of course I’m doing things differently than the Pharisees and the other teachers. My ministry is different because it’s new. Through me, God is doing a new thing in the world.”

The new thing that God was doing through Jesus was built upon the traditions of the Old Testament. In fact, every law and ritual in the Old Testament was pointing to Jesus. But the mission of Jesus was a completely new expression of those old traditions. The old animal sacrifices were preparing the world for the greatest sacrifice of all time—the death of Jesus on the cross for the sins of all humanity. And when Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday, he proved that the new message of the cross was the true interpretation of everything that had come before him.

Now we live as people of the new message. We are people of the cross. If we believe that Jesus died on the cross for us, then our sins are completely forgiven. And by the grace of God, we have the promise of eternal life in heaven. And because we believe in these promises of God, we are living new lives. The Holy Spirit is living inside of us, changing us into the people that God wants us to be.

We are like new wine! No matter how old we are in physical age, we are always new in Jesus Christ. The world says, “You can’t teach an old dog new tricks.” But Jesus says, “Watch me.” When I was in my first congregation, a ninety year old man called the church one day and said that he wanted to be baptized. He had been listening to our services on the radio and he had been changed by the gospel message that he heard every week.

We baptized that man and he became a faithful member of our church until the day that he died. And when he did die, he left a sizable bequest to the church, to be used for overseas missions and local outreach programs. His legacy lived on long after he was gone from this earth. God did something new with that man in the ninth decade of his life! And he can do something new with you right here and right now.

How will God use you in the year to come? How will the Holy Spirit change your heart? What new thing will Jesus do in your life? I don't know. But I know how you can prepare for the work of God in your life. You can prepare by being in worship regularly. You can prepare by reading the Word of God every day. And you can prepare by communing with God in prayer every day.

No matter what your chronological age might be, you can say to Jesus, "I want to be a new wineskin. I want you to pour your new wine into me. I want to grow and stretch and do new things for you this year." Jesus will never ignore a prayer like that. And if you pray that prayer, you will never be the same. May God bless you as you embark on the exciting journey of a new year in Jesus Christ. Amen and Amen!
